
We had an excellent response and the decision was not an easy one, however the Mayor has chosen the following picture by Adam Ord to be used this year.

#### **2015/16 BUDGET SETTING UPDATE**

## "FUNDING CUTS AND SPENDING PRESSURES LEAVE THE TOWN COUNCIL WITH NO CHOICE BUT TO INCREASE THE COUNCIL TAX NEXT YEAR"

The Town Council is currently in the process of setting it's 2015/16 Revenue and Capital Budgets and the Council considered and agreed the draft budgets in October.

The Council's finances are currently in a strong position and in the short term the outlook remains fairly positive with a balanced budget in place, savings continuing to be achieved, and healthy levels of balances and reserves.

As a result, the Council will not need to make any reductions to services next year and the draft 2015/16 Revenue Budget has therefore been prepared in a way that maintains existing levels of service.

However, the Council must also keep a close eye on what is likely to be an increasingly challenging future, and try to plan ahead now, for the difficulties that lie ahead.

The Council is currently reliant on Council Tax Support Grant funding paid by the Government, via Durham County Council, of over a quarter of a million pounds and which amounts to nearly 20% of its Revenue Budget. It has been confirmed that this funding will be cut in the coming years by between 10% and 15% a year, and there remains a risk that it could be withdrawn altogether. The Council is also facing a number of significant spending pressures including the increasing move towards the payment of a 'living wage' for council staff, pension and national insurance reforms, and inflation on running costs.

Unfortunately, in order to maintain services, and absorb the cuts to funding and increases in costs faced over the longer term, the Council has been left with no choice but to consider making a small increase in the Town Council Tax next year.

This decision has not been taken lightly, particularly in light of the on-going cost of living difficulties being faced by local residents, and following on from the four year freeze in council tax delivered by the Town Council between 2010 and 2013.

However, by agreeing, in principle to limit the proposed rise to 2% next year, the increase in the Town Council Tax Bill at Valuation Band A would be limited to less than £3 per year or 5p per week.

This increase will ensure that all of the important services provided by the Town Council to the community of Great Aycliffe can be protected and maintained for at least another year.

Finally it is important to point out that it is still very early in the budget setting process and much could change between now and the final budget being set. The Council will need to keep a close eye on any further developments and respond to these as necessary.

The Council is due to set its 2015/16 Precept and the Town Council Tax in January and I will keep local tax payers informed of future developments via the Council website and in the local press.

#### Still confusion about the Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan!

Although there has been large amounts of publicity surrounding the Neighbourhood Plan it appears there is still some confusion about what the Neighbourhood Plan is and why we are doing it.

In a nut shell there is National Planning Policy which the whole of the country must follow. Then each district/county or borough will then have a local plan, in our case the County Durham Plan, which is in the final stages prior to adoption and considers the whole of County Durham. Then there can be Neighbourhood Plans which are very specific to an area. The Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan is concentrating on planning matters which are specific to our area. We must be in 'general conformity' with the County Durham plan and cannot say NO to development.

Therefore the Neighbourhood Plan is a PLANNING document which contains planning policies for land and business use for the next 20 years for the Great Aycliffe area. For example: if we write a planning policy about allocating a certain piece of land for a Community Building. The plan DOES NOT make that development happen, however it DOES make it an attractive option for developers to build here as the planning rules for that site have already been set.

Finally; the plan must be community led and backed by evidence. The town wide questionnaire is the first round of consultation and is where the plan begins. The vision for the plan is yours, the objectives for the plan are yours, the steering group and working groups will endeavour to turn your vision and objectives into planning policies. The final plan will be checked by an independent examiner, if there is not a clear thread from consultation to vision, to objectives and finally planning policies then this plan will NOT be valid.

Angela Corner states "While I have been engaging with the community and analysing some of the early responses it has become apparent there is confusion over the services which the Town Council provide. There have been a lot of issues raised which are the responsibility of Durham County Council but as they are both generally referred to as 'The Council' I believe this is where the problem begins' The Town Council ARE NOT RESPONSIBLE for

- Taking away garden waste and the proposed new charge for this service
- Recycling
- Emptying refuse bins
- Running the Waste Transfer Station (Rubbish Tip)
- Enforcement (litter or dog fouling)
- Education (other than the Pre-Schools at Woodham and St. Oswald's)
- Housing
- Town Centre
- Anti-Social Behaviour
- Newton Aycliffe Youth & Community Centre
- Newton Aycliffe Leisure Centre
- Community Facilities
- The Library
- Health Services
- Street lighting (other than when on Town Council land)
- Road repairs
- Traffic Enforcement

- Schools

The Council has recently joined the Allotment Watch Scheme which is an initiative supported by Durham Police to help reduce crime on allotment sites and deter criminal activity.

Each allotment site under the scheme will be allocated a colour and all allotment tenants are encouraged to spray their gardening equipment in the identifying colour with paint supplied by the scheme.

solution which will then be registered on the Police Smartwater database. This makes items less attractive to steal and also easily identifiable if stolen allowing items recovered by the Police to be identified to a particular allotment site and tenant.


