TOWN COUNCIL ONCE AGAIN FREEZES THE COUNCIL TAX

What do you get for your Council Tax?

For the fourth year running Great Aycliffe Town Council WILL NOT be increasing the Town Council portion of your council tax bill.

What does this mean for you? The current Town Council tax for a Band A property in Great Aycliffe is £136 per year. Had the council tax risen in line with inflation over the last 6 years you would be paying more than £20 per year extra on your bill.

For just £2.61 a week (less than the price of 4 pints of milk and a loaf of bread) you receive all of the Great Aycliffe Town Council services detailed in this Newsletter

Community Consultation

Extensive consultation and community engagement with the Youth Council, Customer Panel and attending community events across the town ensures that the Town Council provides the services that the residents want and we prioritise our spending, and savings, to reflect your priorities.

The Environment and Activities for Young People are always the top two priorities for investment whilst civic events and the golf course are the areas most often highlighted to make savings.

THE ENVIRONMENT

As part of our commitment to the improvement of green spaces in Great Aycliffe we appointed an Environment Officer and redeveloped the old Pre-School building at Moore Lane to provide an Environmental Centre. In addition, a Town Pride Team has been employed to keep our areas clean and tidy.

The Environment Officer works with all the Primary Schools in Great Aycliffe, as well as a number of other organisations such as Durham County Council Streetscene, the Probation Service and Litterfree Durham to name just a few.

The Town Pride Team, Environment Officer and Aycliffe Youth Council, in conjunction with all the Primary Schools and a few dedicated volunteers, undertake a Town Pride Environment Week each year which consists of a number of litter picks across the Town.

The Environment Officer also holds a wide range of school holiday fun including organised walks, creepy crawly events, making holiday garlands, making art using recycled materials.











KEEPING AYCLIFFE GREEN

A serious issue and major achievement for the Town Council was to secure the protection of the 'greens' of Newton Aycliffe from future housing development and retain the traditional appearance of the older parts of the town.

In addition, we have taken over the running of a number of 'green' areas from Durham County Council. For example, the Town Council is now responsible for the general maintenance for the whole of the Great Aycliffe Way and Byerley Park Nature Reserve.

Did you know that the Town Council works in conjunction with Durham County Council through a Winter Maintenance Agreement to clear certain key footpaths of snow? We are actively engaged in partnership working and try to work with as many partners as possible to provide the best services and facilities for Great Aycliffe.



EFFICIENCIES, SAVINGS AND INVESTMENT

Constant monitoring of spending by Officers and Members, and streamlining of services throughout the six years of the Council, have delivered significant savings against the Council's Revenue Budget.

These savings, together with external grant funding received, have allowed Council Balances and Reserves to be built up, which have been reinvested in the Revenue Budget in line with community priorities – enabling nearly £2 million of capital investment in community assets such as multi-use games areas, play areas, improvement of parks, additional allotments, disabled access works, and numerous environmental initiatives.

Some key investments over the last 6 years:

- ✓ We have employed an Environment Officer, 2 Town Pride Team Officers and 3 Park Patrol Officers
- ✓ Most of the play areas Town Park; Simpasture Park; St Oswald's Park; Byerley Park; School Aycliffe Play Area; Woodham Park and Horndale Park have had significant updating and refurbishment
- ✓ A new BMX Track has been installed at Woodham Park
- ✓ An additional skate board area has been installed at the Town Park along with a toddler play area and sand play
- ✓ Outdoor fitness equipment has been installed at West Park
- ✓ Multi Use Games Areas (MUGAs) have been installed at Woodham and Simpasture Parks
- A formal garden has been created at St Oswald's Park
- ✓ The area where the Great Aycliffe Show is held has been improved with upgrading to a tarmac running track
- ✓ We have provided additional Fun-in-the-Park events





- ✓ The Moore Lane football changing rooms as well as the old pre-school building have been refurbished
- ✓ A new wood has been created and named 'Jubilee Wood' to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012
- ✓ A huge amount of asset management has been undertaken to keep our facilities safe, watertight and accessible has been undertaken
- ✓ Many energy saving measures have been installed in our buildings including solar panels, cavity wall and loft insulation as well as energy efficient lighting
- ✓ We have provided notice boards in various locations and improved our website to keep you informed about what is happening
- ✓ 63 additional allotment plots have been made available providing 205 plots in total

- ✓ We have created a Customer Panel which is regularly consulted and a wide range of issues including the budget
- ✓ We have created a Youth Council and provided them with their own budget

A typical investment and improvement programme can be seen in these before and after pictures. School Aycliffe play area was improved in consultation with the young people, who chose most of the equipment to be installed.









The skate board area within the Town Park is a great example of investment and partnership working.

This extremely popular facility has had the number of ramps and jumps doubled making this a great facility to hold competitions.







LEISURE AND PLEASURE ...

Many facilities at the Oakleaf Sports Complex have been refurbished and revitalised in recent years, including access for as many members of the community as possible. A whole range of additional activities for all age groups have been established.



Helping to Keep Aycliffe Tidy, Clean and Safe

As part of our investment and taking into account residents' views we appointed a Park Patrol Team. The 3 Officers patrol the parks and other Town Council facilities and are now able to provide weekend patrols. They also work very closely with the local Police Teams.

The Town Council also ensures we have a Police Authority liaison and representation on consultative committees.

We actively encourage responsible dog ownership by providing FREE dog poo bags.





Pre-School Centres

We have re-aligned and improved our Pre-School provision to ensure our young children are prepared for school and starting to raise their aims and aspirations from a very early age. Woodham Burn and St. Oswald's Pre-Schools both achieved an Ofsted 'GOOD' rating at their last inspection with some areas achieving 'outstanding'.



And Finally

To ensure that the Council's systems and services are operating efficiently and effectively and that all necessary checks and balances are in place the Council employs an Internal Auditor who prepares quarterly reports and provides recommendations for improvements to the Council.

In addition an external independent body, the Audit Commission undertakes a full review of the Council's finances every year. For the last six years the Council has received a clean bill of health from the Audit Commission. This means that the Council's financial management and governance arrangements are sound, its accounts are good and it is verified as providing 'value for money' to the local community.

Councillor R. S. Fleming, Leader of the Council and Independent Leader, Councillor B. Curtis would like to commend all of the Town Council Staff for their enthusiasm and hard work over the last 6 years.

Giving Nature a Helping Hand

The parish of Great Aycliffe has a rich variety of habitats such as woodlands, wildflower meadows and wetlands that support a wealth of wildlife. We are lucky enough to have species such as Great Crested Newts, Water Voles, Kingfishers and uncommon wildflowers such as Ragged Robin and various orchids such as the Bee Orchid right on our doorstep.

Unfortunately species such as these are under threat on both a local and global scale from the effects of habitat loss, climate change and pollution. There are ways in which we can all help to reduce these pressures – one of these is through conservation.

It's official that nature conservation work is good for you. Research carried out by Oxford

Brookes University has shown that planting trees, erecting fences, clearing out ponds and controlling wayward vegetation can use up as many calories as a step aerobics class, as well as, helping your local environment. Not only is the great outdoors a great place to get fit, it's also a great place to relax. Just being out in the countryside can help to reduce stress levels and combined with the physical health benefits of exercise, conservation work is a great tonic and you can have a real impact on Aycliffe's wildlife.

Great Aycliffe Town Council operate a twice weekly conservation volunteer programme which gives local residents the opportunity to get involved with site improvement works that while directly benefitting nature will also give the participants an opportunity to improve their own health and meet new friends.

Great Aycliffe Town Council are constantly looking for new volunteers or groups who may wish to improve their local environment. No experience is necessary and tasks can be tailored to an individual's or group's own abilities and fitness.


The Town Council have received approval from Durham County Council to undertake a Neighbourhood Plan.

PRE-SCHOOL LEARNING CENTRES

St. Oswald's Pre-School is located in St. Oswald's Park, Wren Close (8.45am to 3.30pm) and Woodham Burn Pre-School is located in Woodham Burn Community School Primary School, Humphrey Close (8.45am to 3.15pm)

Open to all children from their 3rd birthday.

We provide full and part time places and will try to provide flexible hours to meet your individual needs.

FREE nursery funded places are available, the term after a child's 3rd birthday. We only charge £3.00 for a 3 hour session if funding is not available. Hours in excess of the first 15 are just £3.50 each.

> We provide nursery education through the 'new' Early Years Foundation Stage, which came into effect in September 2012
