

Aycliffe Youth Council Start Aycliffe Festival with a Bang!

On Friday 3rd July, 10am until 2pm at the Oak Leaf Sports Complex there will be a range of amazing STEM activities for you to take part in.

The Full STEM Ahead is a really 'cool', or possibly 'hot', event with a Scientific, Technology, Engineering and Mathematical theme, yes it does sound boring, but read on!

Confirmed activities, so far are:-

John Kilcoyne (man in a shed, Brainiac) will give one of his Science shows – be amazed by science.


Do you think you have nerves of steel? Why not try and defuse a 6 foot exploding device! This aims to simulate the stresses and strains soldiers are put under when defusing explosive devices in the world's trouble-spots.



Recruits have just two minutes to make the device safe. If you cut the correct wire then it plays a tune; if you cut the wrong one, or run out of time, then it sounds a claxon and flashes a light.

Test your skills with water tank ROVs and navigate obstacles within the tank.

There will be Formula 1 car(s), hopefully, including some that schools have designed and built themselves; a hand operated scalextrics racing track; robots / robot wars area; a range of motor bikes and additional bodywork (from a project with Daley Mathison, suberbike rider).



Solve the crime by using information within the crime scene.

Test your knowledge and win a prize with one of our challenges. A number of local companies will also be providing hands-on activities for you to try and there will be further information available if you are interested in pursuing a career in these areas. The Youth Council are still working with companies and colleges to provide additional activities.

to change that in our July event and one of our top priorities is getting younger people involved and educated, even those as young as Primary school, but of course we'll keep it very fun! 2015/16 Revenue and Capital Budget

"Funding cuts and spending pressures leave the Town Council with no choice but to increase the Council Tax next year"

The Town Council has recently set it's 2015/16 Revenue and Capital Budget. The Council's finances are currently in a strong position and in the short term the outlook remains fairly positive with a balanced budget in place, savings continuing to be achieved in the current financial year, and healthy levels of reserves.

As a result, the Council will not need to make any reductions to services next year and the 2015/16 Revenue Budget was therefore prepared in a way that maintains existing levels of service.

However, the Council must also keep a close eye on what is likely to be an increasingly challenging future, and plan ahead now for the difficulties that lie ahead.

The Council is currently reliant on Council Tax Support Grant funding paid by the Government, via Durham County Council, of over a quarter of a million pounds and which amounts to nearly 20% of its Revenue Budget. It has been confirmed that this funding will be cut in the coming years by between 10% and 15% a year, and there remains a risk that it could be withdrawn altogether.

The Council is also facing a number of significant spending pressures including the increasing move towards the payment of a 'living wage' for council staff, increases in employers' national insurance costs from 2016, and possible further devolvement of services from Durham County Council. Unfortunately, in order to maintain services, and absorb the cuts to funding and increases in costs faced over the longer term, the Council was left with no choice but to make a small increase of 1.98% in the Town Council Tax next year.

The increase enabled the Council to offset the additional costs of the recently agreed local government pay award, the cut to the Council Tax Support Grant, and a significant fall in pre-school funding income next year, whilst maintaining some surplus resources within the Revenue Budget via the contingency sum and contribution to capital reserves to meet the significant future budget pressures faced.

This decision has not been taken lightly, particularly in light of the on-going cost of living difficulties being faced by local residents, and following on from the four year freeze in council tax delivered by the Council between 2010 and 2013.

However, by agreeing, in principle to limit the proposed rise to less than 2% next year, the increase in the Town Council Tax Bill at Valuation Band A has been limited to less than £3 per year or 5p per week.

This increase will ensure that all of the important services provided by the Town Council to the community of Great Aycliffe can be protected and maintained for at least another year.

SENIOR CITIZENS' EXCURSIONS

The Senior Citizens' Excursions are one of the most popular events organised by Great Aycliffe Town Council. Each year, we organise a series of free excursions for the senior citizens (men or women aged 60 years or over) who live in our Parish. This year the Excursions will start on Monday 1st June and finish on Friday 3rd July.

The application forms and information booklets will be available from Tuesday 21st April until Wednesday 6th May from the Council Offices, Oakleaf Sports Complex, Recreation Centre (Beveridge Way) and the Library in the Town centre.

This year, residents have the choice of visiting the Lake District (Keswick), Northumberland (Hexham), Scottish Borders (Berwick), Scarborough, Blackpool or South Shields for the day with a three course meal and tea or coffee provided in a good quality venue, most with disabled facilities.

Some of the excursions have comfort breaks where tea or coffee with biscuits is provided by the Council.

The coaches provided are 49-53 seater executive coaches with toilet facilities. There is also a 53 seater executive coach with a wheelchair hoist to each destination. This ensures that even people with severe mobility problems can

enjoy a day out. The hoist can be used to assist passengers who need to travel in their wheelchair, but may be used by anyone without mobility difficulties.

Each person who qualifies is entitled to one 'trip'. To qualify you must be aged 60 or over and must have lived in the electoral parish by 1st April 2015.

In 2014, we received 1337 applications so please make sure you apply in time to get the excursion date you would like. The closing date for applications is Wednesday 6th May 2015.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

The County Durham Plan (CDP) Planning Inspector Harold Stephens has said the Durham County Council's 20-year economic blueprint, the County Durham Plan (CDP), contains proposals which are unrealistic, flawed, not justified, deliverable or environmentally acceptable and unsound. However, after reading the full report it is clear that the comments are made predominantly regarding the Durham City area and the housing allocation as well as the Drum Industrial estate and the employment allocations.



What implication will this have on the Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan?

Although this means the CDP is currently suspended work will continue on the Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan (GANP). It has meant that we have taken a step back and reviewed our progress so far to ensure that the work we have done, and will continue to do, is 'sound', 'realistic', 'achievable and deliverable' as well as 'environmentally acceptable'. This review may lead to a few minor changes for the GANP but we are not anticipating any major implications.

The first round of consultation has been complete and feedback is taking place. The Environment Thematic Group has been set up and will review the general comments made to ensure there are no gaps, nothing has been missed and will investigate



options to achieve deliverable planning policies. A Housing Thematic Group will be set up in approximately six weeks, which will complete the same processes.

Officers are currently trying to engage a company to undertake a soft retail assessment to clarify the difference between what residents have said they want during the consultation process and if there is an actual retail need from a business perspective. Unfortunately, to date, there has been no interest from the companies which have been contacted so far.

We will continue to keep you up to date with progress though our newsletter, the Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan Facebook page, Newton News, Aycliffe Today and public meetings.
